

JOIN THE PIPE PROJECTS



The project goals are realized through two main activities: A Water Kiosk at School and Public Drinking Tap Water Stations.

Through this collaboration, we moreover endeavor to bring awareness to the environmental impact of the production and waste of bottled water by promoting the use of refillable water bottles made of BPA-free plastic.

In 2022 we conducted following Join the Pipe projects:

- Madoya Project
- Kencom Public Water Fountain
- Bottle Distributions, Clean ups & Tree planting
- A water kiosk at school: Patriana Education Center

MADOYA PROJECT

Madoya is located in the informal settlement of Mathare. It is the second-largest informal settlement in Kenya, with an estimated population of 206,564 people. The area is characterized primarily by makeshift housing, insufficient water supply, poor sanitation, and poor solid waste management and disposal. Waste disposal is usually along the Nairobi river bank, which borders Madoya. The project was initiated to improve the sanitation facilities run by the **Down Yard Self-Help Group** and clean up the dump site on the river bed. The project was funded by **Leiden University** in the Netherlands.

Between November 10, 2021 and January 26, 2022, two toilets, two bathrooms, and a public drinking water tap were constructed in Madoya, Mathare. The toilets and bathrooms were built on the grounds of and for a local youth group called 'Down Yard Self-Help Youth Group'. The construction process was managed by ITF technician David Munyu, who employed members of the aforementioned youth group and other local (mostly unskilled) casual workers to assist. Overall, a total of KSH 345,310 was spent on the construction process

Furthermore, ITF, in collaboration with the Down Yard Self-Help Youth Group and the Nairobi Metropolitan Services (NMS), conducted a Madoya Clean-Up activity on January 28, 2022. It was a successful event with community participation as well as the participation of a Year 8 class from a local school, Furaha Community High School. At the end of the clean-up, local youth gathered in a nearby church, and a representative of each group (including ITF and NMS) introduced themselves. A total of 150 Join the Pipe reusable water bottles were then distributed to everyone who had participated in the clean-up.

IMPACT

Both community members and youth group members mentioned how the project provided them an income and that the area around the facility had changed. It has remained clean, and hygiene has improved. Residents can now easily access clean restrooms, which will help reduce the number of diseases caused by poor hygiene and sanitation.

KENCOM PUBLIC WATER FOUNTAIN





PUBLIC WATER FOUNTAIN

The Public Water Fountain project aims to install sustainable tap water stations near playgrounds, city centers, parks, schools, and bus stations in Africa which ensure accessible clean drinking tap water. The project also works to bring awareness on the environmental impact of production and waste of single-use plastic water bottles.

In July, our team successfully installed a tap station at Kencom Center bus station, in the heart of the busy Central District of Nairobi. The tap aims to serve passersby and passengers that regularly use that particular route. In collaboration with the Nairobi County Government and the Nairobi Water Sewerage and Company, ITF was able to secure the necessary permits and collaborate with the local government entities to construct a tap water station. While the tap was initially installed in July 2022, we experienced a number of emerging issues regarding a constant and sustainable water supply that led to the tap not being launched and officially becoming in use back then. After the initial complications, we are proud to announce that the tap is officially in use after our launch in December 2022! The tap stands to benefit about 800-1200 people in a day.

BOTTLE DISTRIBUTIONS, CLEAN UPS & TREE PLANTING



FURAHA COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

On February 16, 2022, Victor Okoth Oginga, together with Furaha Community Foundation, invited ITF to join their clean-up and tree planting exercise in Huruma, Mathare. The collected garbage was collected and assembled by NMS for After the clean-up, representatives of several youth groups, ITF, Furaha Community Foundation, and a representative of the City-County introduced themselves their and organizations. Afterwards, about children from Furaha Community Primary School joined the grounds and planted a total of 25 small trees along the riverside of the Mathare River. Afterwards, ITF handed out 100 reusable water bottles to those students and to the youth that had participated in the clean-up.

FURAHA COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL

On February 25, 2022, ITF conducted a community clean-up in Koma Market, Matungulu, which had been jointly organized with Furaha Community High School. Even though the day did not go as planned, as David (ITF's technician), who was meant to bring the ITP push cart, water bottles, and clean-up equipment, got stuck we traffic. were still successfully implement the project with a slight delay. Afterward, ITF volunteers distributed 150 reusable water bottles to the schoolchildren. and the teachers highlighted the positive feedback they were getting from community members.

BOTTLE DISTRIBUTIONS, CLEAN UPS & TREE PLANTING



ST VINCENT SCHOOL

On February 22, 2022, ITF volunteers and Martha, a visitor from Portugal who had joined for a job shadowing activity carried out through the Erasmus+ 4Evergreen project, went to distribute 100 0.5-liter reusable water bottles to St Vincent de Paul Nursery School in Kibera. The school is small and only has three classes: one PP1 class, one PP2 class, and a nursery class. Introduction followed by water bottles was distribution. A meal was then shared among the schoolchildren and ITF.

PALM OLIVE ACADEMY

On March 1, 2022, the ITF team and the visitors Martha (from Portugal) and David (from Join the Pipe, Netherlands) collaborated with the Palm Olive Academy School in Kibera for a community clean-up exercise. Moreover, 267 reusable blue 0.5-liter water bottles were distributed, and ITF conducted a brief environmental talk, highlighting the dangers of plastic waste and the importance of using resusable bottles. The event was successful, with welcoming a reception by the school staff and students and great engagement between ITF and the school. The children were very actively engaged in the clean-up and happy to receive their water bottles.

A WATER KIOSK AT SCHOOL: PATRIANA EDUCATION CENTER

In collaboration with the Global Development Network (GDN), we have kicked off a new water kiosk project in 2022. Initially, the project was to be implemented at Karugia Secondary School in Murang'a County. However, due to a number of reasons, such as:

- Difficulties in tapping water from the identified source
- Unreliable water sources, as they are being rationed and do not have the capacity to supply water continuously and uninterrupted.

A WATER KIOSK AT SCHOOL

This is a school-based and students-managed business designed to sell clean tap water to community residents at an affordable price; a sustainable business model that prefinances a community school in order to set up an on-site water kiosk with specially designed and sustainable products.

Alternative options of tapping into a water network from a nearby town (30km away) or reviving a borehole with saline water were deemed too expensive to execute with regard to the grant budget, which is why we heavy-heartedly decided to focus on another school to complete the project.

The Patriana Education Center was identified, and we officially commenced with the initial school and community mobilization meetings, as local ownership presents a key aspect of our projects and their sustainability.

The construction of the kiosk was started by the end of 2022 and is expected to be finished in the first half of 2023.



ABOUT PATRIANA

Located in Makongeni, Nairobi, Patriana Education Center first opened in 2012 with the aim of improving the education system in the area through offering quality education to every child. The community school serves the surrounding community and neighboring estates, with currently 106 students (68 boys and 38 girls) enrolled and 11 teachers employed. The school is not connected to the water network and relies on a 6,000-liter water tank that is filled up on a monthly basis.

EU ERASMUS + PROJECTS



ITF has been in collaboration with a number of organizations within the Erasmus plus project for several years.

In 2022 we conducted following Erasmus+ projects:

- GO PRO
- 4Evergreen

GO PRO

In the month of March, four ITF volunteers (Wycliffe, Hellen, Joan, and Teresia) traveled to the Philippines for nine days for the 2nd training of trainers of the GoPro project. From October through December, we were able to sign a partnership with an NGO called Resilient Woman. This partnership is one of the activities under the Go-Pro project as a way of enhancing working collaboratively. In this same period, we were also able to have two community meetings and conduct eight training sessions among children and youth in the Manyatta community, with children between the ages of 11 and 18 years. Through this training, we aim to equip participants with ICT including the basics of programming and coding. The training should last a total of 120 hours, and by the end of it, we hope to have instilled some curiosity and interest in the participants related to programming and coding. The training uses a mix of techniques, such as participatory methods, the use laptops, robots, and board games. As of the end of the year, we had participants in the project.

ABOUT THE GO-PRO PROJECT

The main objective of the project is to create space for the development of key information and communications technology (ICT) competences in the field of programming for children and youth. The project plans on achieving this by creating GO-PRO centers where modern programming education can take place and, in the process, awaken the youth's passion for coding. This project is done in collaboration with Meritum (Poland) and the International Transformation Foundation (Kenya).

Through the project GoPro, ITF carried out their 3rd training session with the children, in which they were introduced to a game called scottie-go. This is a hybrid-solution board game that introduces coding and programming in an interactive and fun way to kids.

ABOUT THE 4EVERGREEN PROJECT

This 4Evergreen project bridges two overall objectives: to support awareness-raising on environmental and climate goals and take up innovative practices in a digital era. The project's main aim thereafter is to contribute to the just and inclusive transition to sustainable living through empowering the youth work sector across the globe to raise awareness on environmental issues through personal example and digital tools – the language of young people. This project is being conducted in collaboration with the Association for European Cooperation, Development, and Communication (CODEC vzw) (Belgium).



Under the 4Evergreen project, our social media team conducted a campaign of 100 eco-tip posts. This campaign was carried out between the months of April and June.

Computer Donation & Worspace Migration

In May 2022, ITF donated four computer screens and four CPUs to Icaciri Primary School. This is in line with ITF's digital workspace migration plan, where we aim to build our ideal workspace to better accommodate current needs challenges. This plan includes, among others, the switch to portable computers such as laptops and tablets to allow our volunteers to work from anywhere as well as moving to a digital workspace that allows us to work collectively online, which is why we are donating our current immobile office equipment to those in need.

WHAT ELSE HAPPENED?



ITF Rwanda

For the whole year of 2022, we were occupied with renewing our MoU with the Ministry of education (MINEDUC) and our registration with the Rwanda Governance Board (RGB). successfully renewed our MoU with the MINEDUC for an additional five years to continue setting up Water Kiosks at Schools to help improve the quality of learning outcomes across primary and secondary schools. Due to the delay in approving our registration at RGB, we were unable to implement any projects in Rwanda, and the only activities were related to administrative processes.


